What are Associates?

In the SCA, an associate is a member who has asked or been asked to align themselves with a peer in the Society. Members of the Order of the Chivalry take Squires.



Members of the Order of the Laurel take Apprentices. Members of the Order of the Pelican take Protégés. These mentor/student relationships can exist to guide the associate along a path to becoming a peer. A peer/associate relationship is always unique. It is a personal connection that will be different for each pairing.

Just like each peer is diverse; their view on what a peer/associate relationship should be is different, too. I see my responsibility as a Knight/Pelican to guide my associates on their journey to peerage. I will empower them, create opportunities, and even give a little push to assist them towards growth and knowledge in the SCA. I view my household like a family. I maintain a level of trust that is equal to my blood relations. I vow to protect them and keep them safe while under my care. My associations are two way learning relationships. I believe we both have something to learn from each other. We also have the right to end our relationship at any time, if one or both feel that the relationship is no longer working. I like to keep my active associates under five. More than that, I don't believe I can provide the right amount of time and energy. I have squires in other Kingdoms. I assisted those who were



interested in finding another Peer when I left. Some fostered to other peers, some did not. But I felt that my responsibility is to make sure they were cared for when I am not around. I require that the potential associates approach me. If a discussion ends in "maybe", I ask the person to serve as a man-at-arms or a student first. This gives both of us some time to get to know each other and see if a squire or protégé relationship would be beneficial. My viewpoint is not unique, but it differs from many.



How do other peers view an associate relationship? Some peers will only take on one associate at a time. They realize they only have enough SCA time to devote to that person. Some peers take many associates. I know a Peer who once had more than 100 associates. Is that realistic? How would the peer even have time to work with each one? I know a Knight who provides everything for his squires. He makes them clothes, he buys food at events, provides them a tent, makes them armor. But....when his associates are at the event, they will maintain camp, cook all the food, set up/breakdown, etc. They are living the life of a vassal. Some peers decide to share a household and associates. All the associates are given guidance by each peer. Again...each situation is unique.

How does a member decide to approach a peer or make a decision about becoming an associate? Some Peers expect to be approached about an association. Other peers will approach a potential candidate. I know of one Knight who throws a red belt at a potential squire, if he catches it he's made an offer, if he doesn't.... well let's say he won't be a squire to that Knight.

When someone is contemplating an association with a peer, what factors will they need to consider? Some questions to ponder are: Do they get along with other household members? Is the peer specializing in the subject they are interested in? Does the Peers expectation match the would-be associate? Do your other significant others get along? Would you be friends outside the SCA? Does the Peer have similar views or at least views you can respect on the SCA, life, etc.?

A mismatched association can ruin friendships and other associations for everyone involved. Every facet of the relationship should be examined and considered before an association is made.

I have covered many aspects of the peer/associate relationship and hopefully sparked some ideas. An associate relationship to a peer can be very special. I have been honored to have two squires Knighted and I look forward to the day when they start developing their own relationships with associates.

The Rapen's Warriors

SCA Combat 101 Baron Kyppyn Kirkcaldy, KSCA, OP

There are three main components of SCA fighting: Range, Body Position, and Timing.

Range is the distance between two opponents. They are described as "A" range: very close, belly to belly. "B" range: both opponents within weapons reach. "C" range: Opponent is outside of weapons range.

Body Position is exactly how it sounds, but the complexity of the body position creates the right opportunities. Footing, torso, and arm position all must be adjusted for the correct combination to make an effective strike.

Timing is the decision of when to throw a shot. It's a two-fold process- tracking your opponent's movement and using your own movement to produce an effective shot.

Sounds easy right? Using these three concepts you can make any shot, any time, against anyone.

Unfortunately, you must have all three to make a shot work. What combination and level of complexity you employ to create that shot makes the difference. Let's consider some scenarios.

If you position your body correctly, line up the shot, wait for your opponent to open up and swing...what happens? Well, if you are in C range- you are swiping air. If you are in A Range - you may over shoot. So, this might be best in B range.

If you are in B range and you line up your shot with your opponents head, but you don't wait until he lowers his shield. You will be firing at a shield over and over. You must wait

for the shield to lower. You have to *time* or *guess* the shield lowering and shoot when his head is open.

If you're in A range, belly to belly, and you see your opponents leg open, but your body is not positioned to throw at his leg. You are going to miss the shot.

All three components must be correct for the shot to work.

As you begin your combat career, experienced fighters will offer to show you their techniques. You may watch a tournament and see someone perform an attack that you would like to emulate. It could be simple or very complex. No matter what kind of shot or weapon you are using, all 3 concepts have to be engaged. If you are having trouble with mastering a particular technique, think about each component- Is it Range, Timing, or Body Position that is incorrect. It may be more than one component. But I guarantee it's at least one. Good hunting! ~

Emma Fauconberg

Our Historian, Emma is meeting with each member of Incipient Riding of RavensBridge and creating a brief profile to introduce our brood to the Knowne World. Here is her second profile:



Duchesse Sabine de Rouen is the Chronicler of Ravensbridge, editing the Corvus and providing much of its content. She joined the SCA in 1985 and has been a very active member, serving as Queen of Meridies in 1998 and 2000, thus earning the title of Duchess, reserved for royalty that have served two or more terms as Queen. She has also earned memberships in the Order of the Rose, Pelican, Dragon's Heart, Evergreen, Velvet Owl, and Argent Lily. Finally, Her Grace holds the Awards of the Purple Fret and Willow as well as AOA, GOA, Royal Augmentation of Arms and

has served as both Landed Baroness and Court Baroness.

Duchesse Sabine is a 13th Century Norman, a noble woman from Rouen because of, you guessed it, the garb! She has had other personas and knows she is likely to change and evolve again. She dresses in garb of many cultures and time periods, most notably her own 13th Century Norman and Viking era (apparently she is quite friendly with Kylfur Vinterson). Her garb in any time period is beautiful, intricate, and self-made.



If you do research her many awards as I did, you will find that they all recognize her service to the SCA, unwavering kindness to others, and extraordinary dedication and skills. As an example of why she is so worthy of this recognition both in the Midrealm and now in the East, this is her favorite SCA experience: "I have many wonderful memories. I enjoyed seeing the joyful tears on the faces of those on which I was able to bestow awards while I was queen and I loved sharing the baronial throne with my husband Syr Kyppyn, but a moment that stands out in my mind took place about ten years after I was queen. I was approached by a gentle at Pennsic. He told me that I was his first queen. He remembered me to be lovely and very kind and that I would always be his favorite queen. It was one of the sweetest thing anyone in the SCA had ever said to me. It reminded me that everything we do will touch someone so we should always be kind and do everything with much thought."

Now that she is a resident of the East Kingdom and Ravensbridge in particular, she has new tasks to take on. Her goals here are to see Ravensbridge grow and become a positive and contributing part of SCA society. As Chronicler, her hope is that The Corvus is a source of both entertaining and educational historical and SCA information not only for the people of Ravensbridge but for all that read it.
